


An initiative of Management and Entrepreneurship Skill development

THE BRAIN DRAIN DUE TO PANDEMIC

The local media and the experts of the education department laud that the education crisis was handled brilliantly during the pandemic. But on the grass root level the story was different altogether. It is estimated that this year-and-a-half of pandemic-related school closures, for instance, have created a four-year learning deficit. A student who was in Grade 3 before Covid-19 is now in Grade 5, and will soon enter middle school, but with reading abilities of a Grade 1 pupil.

It is said that we are a progressive digital country, a country which has ample access to mobiles and the internet. But in our Indian society there are households that have four to five children. It is possible that these families may not have enough mobiles so that all the children could access their respective classes at the same time. In my personal experience no they did not have the resources to get used to this sudden shift in the education process. Not only children in schools but also those students who were in their final year of professional courses were seen struggling to acquire the necessary knowledge and skill sets to sustain in the real world. All this was due to lack of in person training or lack of interest or resources to attend the online sessions. Professional degrees where the students are expected to brainstorm and then find solutions where reduced merely to just attempt the MCQ's on an online platform in the comfort of your homes and acquire the necessary degree. This in turn turned out to be the kryptonite for the students as we saw there were many institutions which were not willing to give jobs to these students. They believed that the marks and the grades on their certificate were not justifying the actual skill set that they acquired.

Now the question is who failed over here? Was it the government or the education department or the educational institutes or the student himself? In my opinion each and every one of us failed to do our jobs correctly. Digital integration in the education sector was long due in our country, which was thoroughly neglected by all parties involved in the education sector. Maybe due to lack of intent or lack of interest or just the fear of letting go of the familiar and stepping into an unknown territory. Whatever it may be, it did show us how enormously unprepared we were to face such a crisis situation.

But nevertheless there was a silver lining to this all. Throughout this pandemic we saw the immense ability of our society to shift, pivot and adjust to the changing environment. Our education sector in a matter of months shifted from traditional methods to the digital one. A process which would have taken more than five years in the Pre Covid world was achieved in a matter of months. Yes we were unprepared but now we have got a glimpse of how uncertain the world can be and we as members of the education society should come forward and ensure that we build a robust educational system in place which can sustain and withhold any type of challenges that we may come across in the future.

We all know by now only technology is not enough for educating the young minds but it is a tool that needs to be used by the educators. So as George Couros said "Technology will never replace great teachers, but technology in the hands of a great teacher can be transformational." so let us all keep this in our minds and reinvent the four pillars of our educational system, so that in the future no student is left behind. Let's build towards a future where we have all inclusive education and sustained learning. We must ensure that each and every one of us has the necessary equipment and the skillsets required to ensure that once again the children of our society won't have to face the BRAIN DRAIN due to any pandemic or social situations.
