K - World Environment Day


MES's Pillai College of Education and Research, Chembur, along with Soroptimist









H - International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking

We mourn with the valley, and we carry their stories forward - in our voices, in our prayers, and in our

promise never to forget.

Whispers Over Pahalgam

The Lidder river runs heavy now,

no longer with songs of children,

or the laughter of shawl-sellers weaving dreams at the bazaars, but with the cries of a valley mourning its own.

Pahalgam — the village of shepherds, the land where horses carry promises across pine-scented trails witnessed today a cruelty that even the snow refused to cover.

The morning began with tea boiling on stoves, with prayers whispered before work, with children pressing faces to frosted windows — dreaming of the warmth of a day's honesty.


But by noon, the sky cracked open — and bullets rained where petals once fell.

Tourists who had come to marvel at Aru's glaciers, to dip fingers into the Lidder's rushing silver, fell — strangers in a land that had embraced them, their cameras and smiles crushed under the sudden weight of terror.

A local guide, boots muddy from a life of leading others through paradise, tried to shield a family he did not even know.

He died with their names still on his lips.





Young dreamers, laborers from villages nearby, who had walked miles for work, now sleep a sleep too still, their hopes abandoned on blood-stained stones.

And the marketplace — that once smelled of kahwa and roasted corn — stands frozen, shutters pulled down like closed eyelids

stands frozen, shutters pulled down like closed eyelids too afraid to witness the brokenness again.

The mountains, helpless, watched as sons were lifted by trembling hands, and daughters cried rivers that the Lidder could not contain.

Pahalgam, your green pastures are drenched not in dew today, but in the anguish of fathers who have no graves yet to visit, of mothers who have no lullabies left to sing.

In every cracked window, in every house where the fire has gone cold, the silence howls louder than any storm.

Yet, hear this —
your people, battered but not broken,
will light candles where blood was spilled.
They will chant peace where hatred cracked open the sky.

The river will remember every name —
not as victims,
but as stars stolen too soon,
whose memory will ripple
across generations of a Kashmir still dreaming of dawn.

We will not forget —
not the dreams left unfinished,
nor the innocence stolen mid-breath.

We mourn with you, Pahalgam.

And we promise —
your wounds will be sung into history
as scars of strength, not surrender.




STUDENT'S CORNER
